House Bill Passes – Preserves Sections on Never Events and Public Reporting of Healthcare Acquired Infections.

HR 3962 – Section 1461 page 913 – Requires Public Reporting of Healthcare Acquired Infections. HR 3962 – Section 1751 page 1118 to 1119 – Requires Medicaid to adopt Medicare Rules for non-payment of Never Events.

Debate begins on Combined Committee Bill – Contains Sections on Never Events and Public Reporting.

HR 3590 – SEC. 3001 page 624 – Measures Healthcare Acquired Conditions, including infections.

HR 3590 – SEC. 3025 page 775 – Requires public reporting of all hospital readmissions.

HR 3590 – SEC. 3015 page 721 – The Secretary shall make available to the public, through standardized Internet websites, performance information summarizing data on quality measures.

HR 3590 -- SEC. 2702 page 526 – Payment Adjustment for Health Care-Acquired Conditions—Requires adopting of Medicare Rules for non-payment of Never Events.

Can one eliminate all Healthcare Acquired Infections? Probably not, but you can come very close. Central line associated blood infections were reduced at the Drexel University College of Medicine, Pittsburgh, USA from a 10.5 to 1.2 infections per 1000 line days or patients reduced form 49 to 6 and mortalities for 19 to 1. http://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/sites/entrez/17987871 Pennsylvania is at the forefront of public reporting of healthcare acquired infections.

Colorado Hospital Association (CHA), Policy on National Quality Forum's Never Events

New Infant Mortality Data.

The US has one of the highest infant mortality rates in the industrialized world – ranks 30th. A new CDC report

compensates for differences in treatment and reporting.

- In the US, one in 8 births in the United States were born preterm, compared with 1 in 18 births in Ireland and Finland.
- The US had a higher percentage of preterm births than in Europe.
- The US compares favorably to Europe in mortality rates in preterm infants but has a higher mortality rate in term infants.
- The main cause of the high infant mortality rate in the US is the higher percentage of preterm infants.

Healthcare Acquired Infections:

MRSA Carriers have a higher rate of post operative infections. This study supports the importance of preoperative identification of carriers so appropriate intervention can be initiated.

The American Hospital Association reported that a hospital in Lancaster, PA had a C. Diff. infection rate of 1.2 cases per 1000. To demonstrate further excellence, the hospital instituted even more vigorous standards and protocols which dropped their rate even lower to 0.6 per 1000. The State of Kentucky compares poorly which has a rate of 21.6 infections per 1000 patients.

The argument that infections should not be included in non-reimbursable healthcare acquired conditions because they cannot be prevented, is losing credibility as studies are being published which show that a significant percentage of these infections are preventable.
