"They're saying the [scopes'] benefit is high, and that's true, but they don't really know the risks, because they don't have solid data on complications," says Kevin Kavanagh, an ear, nose and throat doctor who heads Health Watch USA, a patient safety group. "Without knowing the true risks, it's not really an informed decision. It's a judgment call."



New Article Shows How Antiseptics Can Induce Antibiotic Resistance in Bacteria.

Recently the mechanism by which antiseptics can cause bacterial resistance to antibiotics was explained in the Journal of Antimicrobial Chemotherapy. The article studied four different antiseptics including quaternary ammonium and concluded that these antiseptics selected for multi-drug resistant mutants which "resulted in derepression of the multidrug efflux pump AcrAB-ToIC."

Other types of mutations were also observed. The end result was that resistance emerged including resistance to the anticeptic triclosan, nalidixic acid, chloramphenicol and tetracycline and quinolone antibiotics.

"All biocides tested selected MDR mutants with decreased antibiotic susceptibility; these occurred randomly throughout the experiments. Mutations that resulted in de-repression of the multidrug efflux pump AcrAB-TolC were seen in MDR mutants. A novel mutation in rpoA was also selected and contributed to the MDR phenotype. Other mutants were highly resistant to both quinolone antibiotics and the biocide triclosan." Read More at: <u>http://jac.oxfordjournals.org/content/70/8/2241.full</u>

Over a Decade Ago, L. Clifford McDonald, MD, FACP, Wrote About Controlling the MRSA Epidemic in Louisville, KY.

"We have had little success in controlling these forms of resistance in part due to common misconceptions regarding the factors most responsible for the explosive spread of MRSA and VRE. Two such misconception are that MRSA and VRE are already well entrenched in the community and these forms of

resistance frequently develop de novo among susceptible strains in response to intensive antimicrobial pressure. Unfortunately, these misconceptions undermine the importance of preventing patient-to-patient transmission within healthcare facilities as the primary means for controlling resistance." <u>View Article</u> From: McDonald LC.
