
Expensive robots may not be making surgeons — or patients — much better

Some have criticized the ranking system, asking how can a single ranking accurately reflect all of the functions of a hospital. However, in the disjointed, non-unified, often-cost driven system which provides healthcare in the United States, metrics often share a common theme, reflecting the culture of safety in the institution and the willingness of the institution to invest in safety and in nursing.

Patient Perspective, Consent Forms Fall Short of Providing Information to Guide Decision Making.

Journal of Patient Safety: "This study provides evidence from the patient perspective that consent forms are too complex and fail to achieve comprehension. Future studies should be conducted using patients' suggestions for form redesign and inclusion of supplemental educational tools to optimize communication and safety to achieve more informed health care decision making."

The Nation: "Overwork, once a proud hallmark of the medical profession, now symptomizes systemic rot." "Getting safe-staffing ratios codified into all union contracts is a top priority for PASNAP, but it's not enough to go contract by contract, warns Eakin, when many facilities remain non-unionized and management keeps trying to squeeze staff to pump up profits. So PASNAP is pushing for state legislation to mandate staffing ratios at Pennsylvania hospital facilities.

"A dozen nurses and doctors also told state inspectors that nursing and other staff shortages put patients at risk, according to the state's 30-page report released Monday by KentuckyOne Health, which manages the hospital."



Some have stated that the concentration of antibiotics in topical ointments is too low to cause resistance. However, it is low levels of antibiotics not high which is best to promote

One of the reasons for the proposals to curb antibiotic usage in agriculture is for the prevention of low levels of antibiotics in runoff and the contamination of the environment. If we are concerned about low levels of antibiotics in agriculture, we need to have a consistent healthcare policy and be concerned about antibiotics in topical over-the-counter antibiotics.

Even environmental pollution from the manufacture of antibiotics may be an important contributing factor to antibiotic resistance.
